Situation	Child Protection	Supervision	Toilets
Anticipate What could go wrong?	Students approached and/or assaulted by a stranger  Students share the same toilet with the public	Student/s moving away from the supervised area	Student assaulted by a stranger whilst in the toilet.  A student unable to exit from a locked cubicle
Find out  What current controls are in place?	All teachers and parent marshals are identified because they are wearing a fluorescent vest.  Parent marshal to have appropriate WWCC and basic training of expectations regarding supervision.	One teacher to be on continuous supervision of the students.  All students from all schools arrive at the venue and sit in one area.  Supervising teachers meet to share any issues regarding student special needs (eg. behaviour, health)	Supervising teacher or parent marshal to perform a safety check upon each occasion the toilet is accessed by students:  1) ensure that toilets are vacant before allowing students to enter  2) scan toilets for sharps etc.  Students not permitted to enter the toilet whilst a member of the public or an adult or teacher are using  Safety talk to the students to detail expectations regarding how to use the toilet.

You When do you need to review the control?	Risk Management Plan communicated to parent marshal  Review risk management plan and update accordingly.		

Situation	Accidents / Injuries	Student Readiness & Wellbeing
Anticipate What could go wrong?	Concussion Fracture Asthma Anaphylaxis Cramps / Pain Epilepsy Exhaustion  A student is injured or suffers a medical episode whilst unaccompanied by an adult	Students are not prepared for the day including not wearing correct clothes and footwear.  Student becomes anxious and stressed (in particular a student who experiences a disability or has autism) with behaviour that becomes hazardous.
Find out  What current controls are in place?  Eliminate  What else can be done to control this risk?	Teachers to have e-Emergency, Anaphylaxis and CPR training.  First aid kit organised which include ice packs, and general use EpiPen, spacer and asthma puffer.  First aid table set up in shared supervision area with individual general use epipen and asthma puffer/spacer accessible  MediFast medic on site during event.  All teachers must be vigilant for the medical situations of all students.  MediFast medic on site.	Clothing should not restrict movement or hamper students in any way.  Students have appropriate clothing to participate in all events – comfortable, sturdy shoes, school uniform.  Students have food and water.  Students know the plan for the day.  Students to wear sports shoes.  Prepare a map of the part to show students before attending the excursion.  Students use the GO, TELL strategy if they are feeling unwell or are anxious.  Safety talk to the students to detail supervised areas and expectations regarding behaviour and clothing  Show students a map of the park and point out toilets, playing fields and supervised area.  Teachers

You When do you need to review the control?	Review risk management plan and update accordingly.	

Situation	Travelling	Environment
Anticipate What could go wrong?	Bus accident  Students refusing to board bus / running from the group	Storm High winds Excessive Heat Exposure to the Sun Smoke or pollutants in the air Ants, insects, dogs, birds Injury caused by sharps or other hazards
Find out  What current controls are in place?	Safe routes for walking from school to the bus, and when returning.  Designated pick up and drop off outside of individual schools and at venues  Teachers to count their class departing the school, arriving at field and before departing field.  Teachers to count their class on and off the bus and when arriving back at school.  Teachers to count their class at any point where common sense says, to conduct a count.	Teachers and parent marshals to scan the field and look for hazards, e.g. sharp objects.  Monitor weather forecast.  WhatsApp communication regarding cancellation of PSSA on a particular day due to:  Rain Smoke / air pollution Heat Issue at a venue  Venue evacuation established with assembly point at supervised area.  Provide spare hats and access to water and sunscreen
Eliminate  What else can be done to control this risk?  Talk Controls to be actioned by who?	Risk Managemen	All students and adults to wear a hat and bring a water bottle.  Shaded area to supervision  Wear hats and sunscreen at all times (excluding during the game)  Remove sharp objects or direct students away from areas that have been identified as hazardous.  PSSA about safe and appropriate behaviour  It Plan communicated to Staff communicated to parent marshal




Prior to departure

Permission Checklist

### **First Aid and Medical Checklist**

First aid station set up
First aid kits and individual medication readily available for duration of event
Each teacher to have first aid training including anaphylaxis & CPR
Extra ice packs included in First Aid bags
Each teacher & parent marshall to wear a hat and fluorescent vest, and carry a mobile phone
First aid kits contain general use Epipen, Spacer and Asthma Puffer

Supervision Checklist
All teachers have duty of care for all students Students remain in designated supervision area Students with behavioural issues identified and Behaviour Support Plan shared Students with medical issues identified and Action Plans shared Observe members of the public using the field for suspicious or inappropriate behaviour If observed, teacher should ask a member of the public not to take photographs
Sun Safety Checklist
When students are outside, they have to wear a hat Move to shaded areas for break times Students should wear sunscreen Students to have personal water bottles and encouraged to drink regularly Water & Sunscreen available to students without bottles Sitting in shaded areas – avoid prolonged exposure to sun
Toilet Checklist
A teacher to be on duty outside the toilet Supervising teacher to check toilets for members of the public, sharps & other hazards Members of the public must not be in the Toilets whilst students are using them
Emergency Checklist
General supervision area is Emergency Assembly area  Contact emergency services if required
Wellbeing Checklist
Sensory tent for students with special needs to withdraw if required  Set up at First Aid Table

- staff to student ratios
- o risk management
- safe use of equipment
- coaching competencies
- infection control
- o injury management and further health considerations
- medical insurance
- weather and playing conditions

The safe conditions must not be varied unless experts in the particular sport or activity advise accordingly. Safety guidelines specific to that sport or physical activity.

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
